Mabel just knew she was meant to marry a minister.

"I told everybody I was going to marry a minister. And I went to a rural church, so I had opportunities to meet young ministers that were not married," she says.

Growing up on a farm in Missouri, not much exciting ever happened to Mabel, but when a new preacher came to town, she told the Lord, "I'd sure like to iron that man's shirts!"

Henry Addison had been serving in pastoral ministry for three years when he and Mabel first met. "The first thing we knew, we were dating, that was in February 1959. We were married in June," recalls Mabel.

Their union as man and wife was just the beginning of a life-long adventure in serving Christ. Through thick and thin, they moved to Kansas City for Henry to attend Midwestern Baptist Seminary, served in rural churches all over two states and raised three wonderful daughters.

Despite spending time in the big city during seminary, Henry pastored in mostly rural areas. "We interviewed at a city church one time, and Henry and I laughed about it afterward because the city folks didn't even know some of the terminology we used.

So, we decided the city wasn't for us," recalls Mabel.

Like many who served the Lord, the Addisons were bivocational — using their skills in antique furniture restoration and upholstery as well as making handmade draperies to make ends meet.

"During seminary, I worked as a secretary for several of the professors, but the main thing we did to make ends meet during our ministry was upholstery and draperies. Henry was very handy, woodworking-wise. We never advertised, so we knew it was from God. And he provided us with a much-needed secondary income," said Mabel.

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Together, Mabel and Henry served the people of Missouri and Kansas for 57 years in ministry, but in his 50s, Henry's heart began to show signs of wear. He soon had his first open heart surgery and, 10 years later, underwent bypass surgery. As he grew older, his health and heart deteriorated. "He finally had to take resignation because physically he wasn't able to pastor anymore," said Mabel.

When Henry finally passed, Mabel struggled with "just being able to be by yourself and take care of yourself. Just overcoming loneliness." She continues, "I miss his presence, but I've found there's no better way to overcome loneliness than with the Lord. He's a friend that cares at all times. And he's always been there for me."

Shortly after Henry's death, the Addison family learned about Mission:Dignity through a Mission:Dignity Sunday presentation at church. The girls decided that all tributes given in Henry's honor should go to the ministry.

Mabel also soon received a packet with an application for Mission:Dignity, as a local pastor had referred her to the very ministry that the family had supported.

"Because of Mission:Dignity," says Mabel, "I've been able to stay in my own home, pay my utility bills and stay active in the local church — helping missionaries and any others that may need it."

"The ministry is not easy, especially when you're trying to serve the Lord and live your life as an example for others to see. But it's very rewarding," she says.

God is faithful to those he calls, and one way he does this is through the gifts and prayers of those who give to Mission:Dignity.

As Mabel says, "I praise him because I never, ever felt alone. And I still don't." **Praise the Lord.**

Help Honor Retirement-Aged Servants of the Lord

1 Timothy 5:17 tells us, "The elders who are good leaders are to be considered worthy of double honor, especially those who work hard at preaching and teaching." (CSB)

With a desire to serve those worthy of double honor, Mission:Dignity is seeking more retirement-aged Southern Baptist ministers, workers and their widows whose income is insufficient to meet their daily needs, and we need your help!

Recipients of Mission: Dignity funds must:

- Be 65 years of age or older
- Have 10 or more years of paid service with a Southern Baptist church, agency, or institution, or he or she must have been married to someone who would have met age and service requirements
- Meet monthly income limits (income limits change annually call the Mission:Dignity office for the latest)
- Have less than \$45,000 in assets, excluding home



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

Let Your Light Shirl Matthew 5:16



Larry Fackler served the Lord alongside his late wife, Mary Ann, for 34 years Mission:Dignity recipient since 2018.

A Christian has a relationship with the Light — namely Jesus Christ. Jesus takes up residence in the saved person and a radiance emits. The Lord expounded on this truth in the Sermon on the Mount. Matthew 5:14 (CSB) says, "You are the light of the world." Notice that Jesus said, "You are," not "You will become."

Because we have Christ in our lives, we are a witness of the Light to others. Therefore, we need to commit to sharing our faith more effectively. Some facets of the Light:

- The Light is needed in a dark world. The world lives in darkness. God chose his people to be, as it says in Isaiah 49:6 (CSB), "a light for the nations." People search for a light. Without it, life does not make sense to them. They become bored with the darkness, without any light. Think about how difficult it is to live in a house or drive a car at night without lights. It is infinitely worse to live a life without the light of Christ.
- The Christian light is a borne light. In John 8:12 (CSB), Jesus says, "I am the light of the world. Anyone who follows me will never walk in the darkness but will have the light of life." The Christian light comes from Christ. Christians may be compared to the moon as it has no light of itself. Its light comes from reflecting the sun. Likewise, the Christian has a borne light. A Christian gets his illumination from the Son; he gives the light!
- The Christian light cannot be hidden. In Matthew 5:14, 16 (CSB), Jesus said: "A city situated on a hill cannot be hidden. ... Let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven." A Christian cannot escape observation. The world sees the Christian's light. Therefore, we are to share that light with others.
- The Christian light is costly. Allowing a light to shine costs. Wherever there is light, there will be sacrifice. Energy is expensive. When a candle burns, it gives of itself. John the Baptist was a light for Christ, but even he said, "I must decrease," John 3:30 (CSB). It cost him his life to shine for Jesus. Allowing Christ to shine through us will not only cost us our lives but also our time, talents and treasures.

Do you know people who are living in darkness? You have the Light. They need the Light. Would you resolve to share the Light of the world with them this week?
